EXHIBITION DATES

1. The Canadian Lakehead Exhibition will be held at Exhibition Park from Wednesday, August 7th to Sunday, August 11th, 2024.

ELIGIBILITY TO ENTER EXHIBITS

- 2. Anyone who completes the Entry Form (subject to eligibility Requirements for the Class) may exhibit at the C.L.E.
- 3. There will be no exhibitor's fee. Although not required, membership in the C.L.E. is encouraged. The membership fee is \$10.00 per year and may be purchased at the C.L.E. office. (Out of district exhibitors must be paid up members of the Canadian Lakehead Exhibition.)
- 4. In lieu of an exhibitor's fee, a 10% fee will be deducted from the prize money earned to cover administration costs. Exhibitors whose prize money totals \$5.00 or less will be exempt from this fee. <u>Junior categories will be exempt.</u>

ENTRY FORMS

- 5. Entry forms are included in the Prize List and may be photocopied. Additional Entry Forms are also available from the C.L.E. office, as well as on the website, following publication of the Prize Book.
- 6. All entries must be completed on the printed Entry Form and signed by the Exhibitor.

- A. Quilt/Wall Hanging must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" (480cm), measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition). The article can be square, rectangular, etc.
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
- D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

HORTICULTURE

JUDGING STANDARD SECOND EDITION 2019 WILL BE USED FOR ALL VEGETABLES, FRUIT, FLOWERS, AND DECORATIVE WORK.

All Exhibits in Classes 66 and 67 must have been in the possession of the Exhibitor for two months prior to the Exhibition.

Classes 66 and 67 will be displayed in a protected area so that no damage may result. Hanging baskets will be supported for proper effect, and therefore must be brought in suitable containers for this purpose. Please attach any special watering instructions, if necessary.

In classes 68 through 79 any exhibit that contains insects or their debris will be disqualified from the exhibit hall.

DEFINITION OF TERMS:

ANNUAL - An herbaceous plant which normally completes its cycle or growth from seed in one year.

ARRANGEMENT - The result of the artistic use of plant material and/or accessories.

BASKET - A container of such material as wood fibre, metal, glass, pottery, plastic, etc., with a handle.

- BIANNUAL An herbaceous plant which requires two growing seasons to complete its normal growth cycle, i.e.: Sweet William.
- BLOOM An individual flower, one to a stem. Specimen blooms should be disbudded.
- BOUQUET A design of flowers and/or foliage fastened together to be carried, i.e.: a bride's bouquet. BOWL A container broader than it is high.
- BUD An immature flower insufficiently expanded to show the form of a typical bloom.
- CACTUS Any member of the family Cactaceae. Succulent or fleshly-stemmed plants on which the leaves are replaced by scales or sharp spines.
- CONDITION The quality of the exhibit at the time of judging. This includes freshness, freedom from blemishes or bruises, whether due to insect, disease, or mechanical causes.
- CREATIVITY A fresh individual approach in the selection and combination of material. An imaginative and obvious effort to create difference and retain artistic merit.
- DECORATIVE WOOD Includes any drift or weathered wood, roots, etc., treated or untreated.
- DISPLAY An exhibit of flowers, fruits, plants or vegetables (or a composite exhibit) covering a definite number of specimen's, or given area, arranged to create a pleasing effect. A display is to be judged both for the quality of the material and for the artistry of the result.
- FOLIAGE Leaves of trees, shrubs and other plants
- PERENNIAL An herbaceous plant that lives for more than two years, i.e.: phlox, dephiniums, peonies, etc. The stem dies to the ground each fall.
- PREDOMINANT A design in which one kind of flower or one colour is emphasized. Other flowers, foliage or colours must be included in a secondary role.
- SPIKE A thick, upright stem carrying several flowers, usually with short pedicels, such as gladiolus, stocks, snapdragons, and balsam.
- SPRAY A portion of a plant with a number of flowers, i.e.: chrysanthemum, climbing and floribunda roses.
- STEM OR STALK A plant structure carrying one or more flowers and buds. It may be branched, i.e.,: Sweet Peas, primulas and irises.
- SUCCULENT Any plant with fleshy stems and/or leaves i.e.: Crassula, Sedum.
- UNIFORMITY All specimens in an exhibit should be as nearly alike as possible in size, form and colour.
- VASE A vessel for displaying flowers having a height greater than the diameter of its mouth.
- WILD FLOWERS Native flowers that grow without cultivation.

TIPS FOR DISPLAYING FLOWERS

We would like to give you a few suggestions for displaying flowers at the fair.

- 1. Read your show schedule carefully well ahead of the show.
- 2. Keep in mind that your specimen or display needs to look reasonable for six days
- 3. Plants should be well watered day before cutting.
- 4. Cut flowers 5 6 hours prior to arranging. Best time to cut flowers is early in the day or evening. Cut and place immediately into cool water.
- 5. Condition all cut flowers. Place cut flowers into warm water to which add a few drops of javex, plant food, or clear carbonated beverage such as 7Up.
- 6. Display containers should be clean and suitable for specimen, i.e. lilies, sunflowers, dahlias, hollyhocks need heavy container such as milk bottles.
- Arrangements Displays:
 Condition all plant material prior to arranging. Use only clean suitable containers. Oasis for fresh flowers, sahara for dried flowers. Soak oasis in warm water.



- The exhibit should be free from disease, insects, and damage from handling, displayed on suitable size white paper plate.
- 2. Select exhibits of good even size, not too large or too small, tender, crisp, and fresh.
- Color should be bright and typical of species.
- 3. Trim all exhibits;
 - Onions green, 4"-6" tops above white shank.
 - Onions dry, top 1\2", skin intact.
 - Peas, Beans, Peppers, and Cucumbers 1\2" of stem attached.
 - Melon, Pumpkin, Squash, and Zucchini, 2" of stem attached.
 - Carrots, Beets, Parsnips and Radish, 2"of stem attached. Trim all roots to 1\2".
 - Tomatoes, calyx attached.
 - Corn, 1/3 of husk and silk removed from tip down.
 - Potatoes, brushed clean, free of disease, greening, and insect damage.
- 4. Check show schedule for exact number called for. Do not mix varieties or types except in collections or displays.
- 5. Wipe off residue, avoid soaking and washing, as it may damage color of specimen.
- Apples, Cherries, Pears, Plums, stems attached. Strawberries 1" of stem attached
 Raspberries, remove core, and stems.
- Collections and Displays of vegetables and/or fruit: A group of a number of kinds, and cultivars, (7) of vegetables and or fruits in one exhibit.
