## GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

## Exhibition Dates

1. The Canadian Lakehead Exhibition will be held at Exhibition Park from Wednesday, August 7th to Sunday, August 11th, 2024.

## Eligibility to Enter Exhibits

2. Anyone who completes the Entry Form (subject to eligibility Requirements for the Class) may exhibit at the C.L.E.
3. There will be no exhibitor's fee. Although not required, membership in the C.L.E. is encouraged. The membership fee is $\$ 10.00$ per year and may be purchased at the C.L.E. office. (Out of district exhibitors must be paid up members of the Canadian Lakehead Exhibition.)
4. In lieu of an exhibitor's fee, a $10 \%$ fee will be deducted from the prize money earned to cover administration costs. Exhibitors whose prize money totals $\$ 5.00$ or less will be exempt from this fee. Junior categories will be exempt.

## ENTRY FORMS

5. Entry forms are included in the Prize List and may be photocopied. Additional Entry Forms are also available from the C.L.E. office, as well as on the website, following publication of the Prize Book.
6. All entries must be completed on the printed Entry Form and signed by the Exhibitor.

## Deadline for Entry

7. Entry Forms should be received at the C.L.E. office on or before the listed date and time. Entry Tags will be issued. If Entry Forms are E-mailed or Faxed, exhibitor is responsible for picking up the Entry Tags. The exhibitor must securely attach the Entry Tag to each exhibit in a place that can be readily seen. (DO NOT USE STRAIGHT PINS).

## ALL ENTRY FORMS TO BE RECEIVED NOT LATER THAN 7:00 P.M., FRIDAY, JULY 26, 2024

## Dates for Exhibits to be Delivered to the Dorothy E. Dove Building

8. The building will be open to receive exhibits as follows:

- Homecrafts, Classes 1-53

Friday, August 2, 2024-9:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m.

- Other Classes

August 6, 2024-12:00 Noon to 7:30 p.m.
9. All exhibits must be on the grounds and in place on the above stated dates and times and remain until the close of the exhibition.

## Removal of Exhibits from the Dorothy Dove Building

10. All exhibits should be removed on the following dates and times:

Tuesday, August 13, 2024-9:30 to 11:30 a.m. - Nursing Homes
Tuesday, August 13, 2024-12:00 Noon to 7:30 p.m. - Exhibitors
Any exhibits not claimed after the above date WILL BE DISPOSED OF BY THE C.L.E.

## Payment of Prizes

11. Prize money will be distributed when exhibits are returned or as soon as possible after the Exhibition.

## OWNERSHIP OF EXHIbITS

12. Every exhibit entered must be grown or made by the persons entering same, unless otherwise specified. Should any fraud or deception be discovered on the part of an exhibitor, the Committee will withhold any prize awarded and prohibit the exhibitor from entering for a specified time period
13. Diligence will be used by the officers of the Association to prevent injury or loss and to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition, but the owners, themselves, must take the risk of exhibiting, and should any article be accidentally lost, stolen or damaged the Directors will render all assistance in their power toward its recovery, but will not make any payment of the value thereof, or be otherwise liable.
14. An exhibitor may enter only one item per section of each class, unless otherwise stated. NO article can be entered in more than one section.
15. Only new and up-to-date work may be exhibited, unless otherwise stated. Work which is soiled, defaced or old work will be disqualified.


GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (Continued from page 6)
16. (a) In classes 30A, 30B, $31 \& 32$, sewn articles require a $5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 5 \mathrm{~cm}\left(2^{\prime \prime} \times 2^{\prime \prime}\right)$ fabric swatch attached to the entry tag.
(b) In classes 30A, 30B, $33 \& 34$, a $20 \mathrm{~cm}\left(8^{\prime \prime}\right)$ yarn sample(s) must be attached to the entry tag.
(c) Entrants in the culinary arts and horticulture must provide their own containers. In horticulture, clear glass is preferable. For baked goods - see diagram on page 36.
17. In the absence of competition in any class, prize worthiness is at the discretion of the judge.
18. If an article is entered in a class to which it does not belong, it will not be awarded a prize.
19. It is the responsibility of the Creative Arts Committee, not the Judge, to determine that exhibits meet the requirements specified in the Prize List. The Judge's duty is to place exhibits and report any irregularities to the person in charge.
20. The decisions of the Judge or Judges shall be final as to the awarding of prizes and no appeal shall be considered. All prize winners' names will be displayed.
21. All 1st prize winning articles are not eligible for future competition at the Canadian Lakehead Exhibition.
22. Late entries will be accepted for display only, and if desired, your name may be put on this exhibit.
23. Not following the rules of the Association on the part of the Exhibitor shall incur the loss of any prizes awarded.
24. Absolutely No Cannabis will be allowed in any of our exhibits.

## General Conditions

A. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) to be eligible for this competition.
B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of $324^{\prime \prime}(480 \mathrm{~cm})$, measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
C. The winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
D. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
E. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
E. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and / or Convention OAAS competition.

# Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies ANNUAL MACHINE-QUILTED QUILT / WALL HANGING COMPETITION Eligibility, Rules and Regulations 

## General Conditions

A. Quilt/Wall Hanging must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of $324^{\prime \prime}(480 \mathrm{~cm})$, measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition). The article can be square, rectangular, etc.
C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
E. The winning OAAS Champion Machine Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.
F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.
G. Quilt/Wall Hanging must have visible machine quilting.

## O.A.A.S. ANNUAL QUILT COMPETITION

"Best of Show" quilt from the C.L.E. in both machine and hand quilting categories may enter the District Competition in the Fall - the winners will be notified. The District winning quilts are eligible to proceed to the O.A.A.S. Convention in February where a Grand Champion Quilt will be selected and prize money awarded.

In classes 68 through 79 any exhibit that contains insects or their debris will be disqualified from the exhibit hall.

## DEFINITION OF TERMS:

ANNUAL - An herbaceous plant which normally completes its cycle or growth from seed in one year. ARRANGEMENT - The result of the artistic use of plant material and/or accessories.
BASKET - A container of such material as wood fibre, metal, glass, pottery, plastic, etc., with a handle. BIANNUAL - An herbaceous plant which requires two growing seasons to complete its normal growth cycle, i.e.: Sweet William.
BLOOM - An individual flower, one to a stem. Specimen blooms should be disbudded.
BOUQUET - A design of flowers and/or foliage fastened together to be carried, i.e.: a bride's bouquet. BOWL - A container broader than it is high.
BUD - An immature flower insufficiently expanded to show the form of a typical bloom.
CACTUS - Any member of the family Cactaceae. Succulent or fleshly-stemmed plants on which the leaves are replaced by scales or sharp spines.
CONDITION - The quality of the exhibit at the time of judging. This includes freshness, freedom from blemishes or bruises, whether due to insect, disease, or mechanical causes.
CREATIVITY - A fresh individual approach in the selection and combination of material.An imaginative and obvious effort to create difference and retain artistic merit.
DECORATIVE WOOD - Includes any drift or weathered wood, roots, etc., treated or untreated.
DISPLAY - An exhibit of flowers, fruits, plants or vegetables (or a composite exhibit) covering a definite number of specimen's, or given area, arranged to create a pleasing effect.A display is to be judged both for the quality of the material and for the artistry of the result.
FOLIAGE - Leaves of trees, shrubs and other plants
PERENNIAL - An herbaceous plant that lives for more than two years, i.e.: phlox, dephiniums, peonies, etc. The stem dies to the ground each fall.
PREDOMINANT - A design in which one kind of flower or one colour is emphasized. Other flowers, foliage or colours must be included in a secondary role.
SPIKE - A thick, upright stem carrying several flowers, usually with short pedicels, such as gladiolus, stocks, snapdragons, and balsam.
SPRAY - A portion of a plant with a number of flowers, i.e.: chrysanthemum, climbing and floribunda roses.
STEM OR STALK - A plant structure carrying one or more flowers and buds. It may be branched, i.e.,: Sweet Peas, primulas and irises.
SUCCULENT - Any plant with fleshy stems and/or leaves i.e.: Crassula, Sedum.
UNIFORMITY - All specimens in an exhibit should be as nearly alike as possible in size, form and colour. VASE - A vessel for displaying flowers having a height greater than the diameter of its mouth.
WILD FLOWERS - Native flowers that grow without cultivation.

## TIPS FOR DISPLPYIIG FLOLUERS

We would like to give you a few suggestions for displaying flowers at the fair.

1. Read your show schedule carefully well ahead of the show.
2. Keep in mind that your specimen or display needs to look reasonable for six days
3. Plants should be well watered day before cutting.
4. Cut flowers 5-6 hours prior to arranging. Best time to cut flowers is early in the day or evening. Cut and place immediately into cool water.
5. Condition all cut flowers. Place cut flowers into warm water to which add a few drops of javex, plant food, or clear carbonated beverage such as 7Up.
6. Display containers should be clean and suitable for specimen, i.e. lilies, sunflowers, dahlias, hollyhocks need heavy container such as milk bottles.
7. Arrangements - Displays:

Condition all plant material prior to arranging. Use only clean suitable containers. Oasis for fresh flowers, sahara for dried flowers. Soak oasis in warm water.

All entries ~ large or small ~ are welcome, provided they meet Prize Book instructions.

1. The exhibit should be free from disease, insects, and damage from handling, displayed on suitable size white paper plate.
2. Select exhibits of good even size, not too large or too small, tender, crisp, and fresh. Color should be bright and typical of species.
3. Trim all exhibits;

- Onions green, $4^{\prime \prime}-6^{\prime \prime}$ tops above white shank.
- Onions dry, top $1 \backslash 2{ }^{\prime \prime}$, skin intact.
- Peas, Beans, Peppers, and Cucumbers 1 $12^{\prime \prime}$ of stem attached.
- Melon, Pumpkin, Squash, and Zucchini, 2" of stem attached.
- Carrots, Beets, Parsnips and Radish, 2 "of stem attached. Trim all roots to $1 \backslash 2$ ".
- Tomatoes, calyx attached.
- Corn, $1 / 3$ of husk and silk removed from tip down.
- Potatoes, brushed clean, free of disease, greening, and insect damage.

4. Check show schedule for exact number called for. Do not mix varieties or types except in collections or displays.
5. Wipe off residue, avoid soaking and washing, as it may damage color of specimen.
6. Apples, Cherries, Pears, Plums, stems attached. Strawberries 1 " of stem attached Raspberries, remove core, and stems.
7. Collections and Displays of vegetables and/or fruit: A group of a number of kinds, and cultivars, (7) of vegetables and or fruits in one exhibit.
